





Elementary Overview





Elementary School by the Numbers School Year - Typical (10/1/22 Enrollment Information)

- 15 elementary schools serving approximately 5000 students from Newton and Boston
- Students in grades Kindergarten through Grade 5
- **257 elementary classrooms**
- 718 kindergarten students in 39 classrooms
- Average elementary class size is 19.6
- Average kindergarten class size is 18.4



Newton METCO Program



METCO is a state-funded, seat-availability, voluntary integration program

Goal: Increase diversity and reduce racial imbalance

- 412 METCO students K-12, 3% of student population
- Approximately 3000 students statewide participating in 33 suburban school districts serving from Boston and parts of Springfield




Student Services: Student Supports

*We understand that all students need extra help or support at one time or another.

*In our elementary school we have social workers, psychologist and Social Emotional Team members available to all students.

*Our goal is to support student learning



Student Services: Special Education

Inclusion is a belief that everyone belongs and everyone benefits. This educational model challenges schools to meet the needs of all students by educating learners with disabilities alongside their non-disabled peers.

~NPS Guide to Special Education Programs

- If a child is already on an IEP, then NECP will support the transition to elementary school.
- Each elementary school has a Team Specialist who is the contact person for school based questions.

Special Education Parent Advisory Council

The Newton Special Education Parent Advisory Council (Newton SEPAC) is an all-volunteer group of parents of children with special needs in Newton, MA. As mandated by Massachusetts law, SEPAC provides feedback to the School Committee and school district on special education programs and policies, and participate in their planning and development.





Kindergarten Registration Timelines



BUFFER ZONES

A defined area for which individual addresses may be assigned to one of two elementary schools.



- Your online registration will automatically note if you are in a buffer zone
- Through the online registration process, parents/guardians may request a preferred school from one of the two designated elementary schools in the zone.
- Requests will be granted based on space availability.
- Students in these zones do not have a designated home school until the district assigns them one.



Kindergarten Screening

School based visits, orientations and screenings will be scheduled by individual schools between April 25 and May 26, 2022



Screening Process

- Sign in with your child
- School may take a photo of your child
- Your child will go with a teacher to do some activities (20 minutes)
- School staff you may meet with include:
 - Administrative Assistant
 - School Nurse
 - Staff Member to review paperwork
 - After-School Program Director



Screening Day

The process involves:

What can you do to help your child be "ready" for Kindergarten?

- **■** Encourage your child's independence
 - Self-help skills such as dressing, bathroom, and opening snacks
- **■** Encourage your child to advocate for their own needs
- Read with your child
- Count with your child
- Visit your school's playground
- Continue using the languages you feel comfortable with at home
- Remember: Transitions can be HARD for children and adults!
